Géraldine Fiss is an Associate Teaching Professor at the University of California, San Diego. Fluent in Swedish, French, German, English, and Chinese, all her work reflects a global outlook. With articles and book chapters on such diverse figures as Xu Nianci, Ding Ling, Feng Zhi, and Mu Shiying, among others, Fiss's scholarly interests span the modern period in China and beyond. She currently is completing a book that examines fin de siècle travel narratives from Germany and China.

Joanna Krenz (PhD Leiden University, 2018) is an Assistant Professor at Adam Mickiewicz University and a visiting scholar at the University of Zurich. Her research focuses on literature, especially poetry, and its interactions with other disciplines, including natural sciences, technology, and philosophy. She is also an active translator of contemporary Chinese literature in prose and in verse into Polish. Her monograph *In Search of Singularity: Poetry in Poland and China Since 1989* is forthcoming from Brill.

Fang-yu Li is Associate Professor of Chinese Language and Culture at New College of Florida. She has published articles on literature and film from China, Taiwan, and Hong Kong. Her current research looks at the role of the "writer" in contemporary Sinophone literature and the ways in which authors critically examine their writer identity in self-reflexive novels.

Wenzhu Li is a PhD student in Modern Languages and Cultural Studies at the University of Alberta, having recently completed an MA thesis on the poetry and prose of Zhai Yongming.

Christopher Lupke is Professor of Chinese Cultural Studies at the University of Alberta and former chair of the Department of East Asian Studies. His work primarily focuses on postwar Taiwan and China, and he has written a book on the Taiwanese auteur filmmaker Hou Hsiao-hsien in addition to editing and co-editing several other volumes. Lupke also is a prolific translator from Chinese to English, and his recent publication, a translation of Ye Shitao's *A History of Taiwan Literature* (Cambria Press, 2020), won the Aldo and Jeanne Saglione Prize for the translation of a book-length scholarly work on literature.

Laura L. Velazquez-Velazquez is a PhD candidate in Modern Languages and Cultural Studies at the University of Alberta with an emphasis in comparative literature. Her research explores the entanglements between citizenship and rhetoric in a series of hispanophone and sinophone migration narratives. She is currently working on a translation of Zhai Yongming's poetry into Spanish.

Yanhong Zhu is an Associate Professor in the Department of East Asian Languages and Literatures at Washington and Lee University. Her research interests include literary and film theory, modern Chinese literature, and Chinese cinema. Her articles have been published or are forthcoming in *Chinese Literature Today*, *Journal of Chinese Cinemas*, *Journal of East Asian Popular Culture*, *American Quarterly*, *ECCE*, and in several edited volumes on modern Chinese literature, Chinese cinema, and Chinese language pedagogy.
